Instructions for students on how to prepare case reports

- 1. Every student should prepare one case report (i.e., not one case for more students)
- 2. "Open" cases (i.e., waiting for epilepsy surgery decision, not operated on) are highly preferred
- 3. Time of one presentation should be restricted to 10 min. in order to enable a subsequent discussion.
- 4. Scalp EEG and (if possible) video of a spontaneous seizure of your patient should be a part of the presentation. Use either your video/EEG software at your laptop or provide a video file and pictures (PrintScreen) of representative EEG abnormalities in your presentation.
- 5. Having brain MRI (or at least brain CT) of your patient is highly advisable. It is much preferred to see the whole MRI study (loaded to your laptop or at CD) than to show one or few MR pictures in your presentation.
- 6. Please try to use the template of presentation attached. This is a rough guide; you could modify the slides to fit to your case. It is not necessary to know and fill in all information listed; don't be stressed if you have some data missing! The most important issue is to try to summarize your localization hypothesis and formulate questions regarding a planned surgical approach. Please limit your presentation to max. 10-12 slides!
